SHORT-TERM MISSION TRIPS: THE GIFT TO GO!

Jesus said, "Go!" American Baptists know the message and command of the great commission:

And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:18-20, NRSV).

Mission is part of the DNA of ABCUSA – we're called to be missional at home, locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally. Thankfully, American Baptists take seriously God's call to "Go!"

But when, where, and how are we to "Go!"? Partnering with the Lord in God's global mission is more than spontaneously pulling up stakes and moving our families to a foreign country on a feeling or urge without an invitation. Mission is always initiated with an invitation from the Spirit of the Lord! We join God's mission in Christ to evangelize and serve the nations (Gen. 10-11). Great mission trips always start with an invitation of the Spirit to join God's mission to a place and people — because it is always God's mission, not ours or the churches' saving work in the world.

Our invitation to "Go!" arrived on Wednesday, October 26, 2022. The Spirit of God prompted the Rev. Charles Jones, Senior Area Director at International Ministries, to contact me about a teaching need at the Liberia Baptist Theological Seminary in Monrovia, West Africa. The school needed someone to teach graduate students New Testament Theology during a two-week intensive in January 2023. My immediate response was, "Yes! Here am I, send me!" (Isaiah 6:8). I had prayerfully asked God to guide me to a short-term mission experience. Of course, I would need to ask my family and church's permission, which they joyfully and unanimously approved. We were ready to say "yes" because the Lord had prepared our hearts, minds, and bodies for a short mission trip, thanks to prayer.

Next, I needed to find a traveling companion. Jesus sent his disciples two by two into the mission field (Luke 10). To be faithful to God's mission in the Bible, I felt compelled to find someone to travel with me. God invites us to partner in mission with family, friends, churches, agencies, international networks, etc. I do not believe God calls us to work in God's mission field alone! After asking a couple of people to consider joining me prayerfully, God revealed my missionary partner would be our adult daughter, Jessamine. She is a senior and ABWMCR scholar at Ottawa University. Jessa was finishing her final semester in Secondary Education: English. The trip fit perfectly into her schedule before she needed to start student teaching. She served in the seminary library and the English department while I taught theology.

There were hundreds of details to address before the trip, including passports, visas, flight plans, securing supplies, multiple vaccinations, and documents. The biggest challenge was raising \$7,000.00 for our travel and expenses in less than six weeks. We trusted the Lord! If God called us to "Go!" the Lord would provide the funding. God was faithful! God was "able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine" (Ephesians 3:20). The Lord provided us closer to \$11,000.00 for this trip. We realized the Lord had bigger plans than just teaching and working in the library. The Lord showed us several mission projects God planned to accomplish as we listened to the Spirit and our new friends in Liberia:

- Theological books and supplies for the seminary library,
- Poultry and project funds for the seminary farm community,
- Electrical, plumbing, and repair projects on the campus, and
- Fish and food for the seminary cafeteria and nutrition program.

IM also invited us to visit the project sites funded by the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering (World Relief Committee) at the Antioch Baptist School and Church, which happens to be the special project for the American Baptist Women's Ministry of the ABCCR. [We will write about each of these projects in future CR articles.]

Our primary goal for this short mission trip was to "Go!" be good guests. We were invited as honorary guests of Dr. Momolu A. Massaquoi, seminary president, and the LBTS community through our national partner, International Ministries (American Baptist Foreign Mission Society). We planned to be exceptional guests who were open, honest, humble, reliable, and obedient, just as Jesus instructed his disciples in Luke 10.

The Liberians did not invite us to be rigid, demanding, bossy persons from a privileged world; shortcomings of North Americans we heard about on our previous mission trips to Albania, Costa Rica, Oklahoma, and Mexico. They needed us to be guests who quickly joined the community, submitted to their leadership, and accepted our tasks freely by asking them what to do, how to do it, when, and why. Yes, we honestly shared our limitations and needs, which they joyfully accommodated, like reducing the spiciness of the food.



The trip was a success because we made countless new friends, and LBTS graciously gave us Liberian clothes and African names (yes, we have new names), and they often said, "You're not like other north Americans. You didn't hide out in the guest house but assimilated right away. You were flexible, humble, and didn't tell us what to do." The greatest joy was being asked to come again, "next time for a year or more."

The three weeks went by quickly! There are innumerable lessons learned on this trip which we will write about in future CR articles. We were the objects and subjects of mission; God was working on and in us as much as through us. The biggest lesson I learned was the trip was altogether a gift! God invited us to "Go!" IM and LBTS invited us to "Go!" by partnering with IM's Office of Short-Term Missions. My wife and family said, "Go!" West Side Baptist Church in Topeka said, "Go!" by giving me paid time off without using vacation. Friends and family said, "Go!" with their prayers and financial partnerships. The ABCCR Mission & Evangelism Vision Team said, "Go!" with their financial support and encouragement. Central Seminar said, "Go!" with their donation of academic journals for the seminary library. We will truly be eternally thankful for the gift to go!

We want to go again. However, we first must ask: how can we say "Go!" to others around us? God is actively working in global mission. There are ABCCR churches and members who feel the Lord inviting them to "Go!" join God in international service — short-term and long-term. How can we call, train, and send servants to "Go!" be great guests and servants in God's mission field? How can we as individuals and churches prayerfully partner with God in global mission by supporting the Lord's servants each month and annually through the World Mission Offering?

Hopefully, if God offers you the gift to "Go!" your family and ABCCR churches will say "Go!" for the glory of God in Jesus'

name.

PRAYER IN LIGHT AND DARKNESS

This week I started reading Tish Harrison Warren's book, Prayer in the Night: For Those Who Work or Watch or Weep. In her book, Warren, an Anglican priest, meditates on one of the prayers towards the end of Compline. Compline, or the Night Prayer, is the final prayer liturgy in the Common Book of Prayer for the end of the day and just before night. Each chapter is a look at a section of the prayer.

Warren takes an honest look at what it means to be a person of faith who must live in both the light and the darkness. She recognizes each of us needs comfort and hope in times of struggle, fear, and loss. None of us are safe from pain and death. Warren believes "we need practices that don't simply palliate our fears or pain, but that teach us to walk with God in the crucible of our own fragility." (19). Truly we are fragile creatures, and it is in those times of darkness we can, and should, turn to God.

I was struck by a blurb on the inside cover of the book. James K. A. Smith said in his review of the book, "Prayer is how we press our hands into the invisible and find the hand of Christ reaching back." What a fearsomely beautiful image. When we reach out in our deepest need, we have the assurance Christ is there, reaching back.

Below is the Compline prayer from Warren's book. Sometimes, when we feel most helpless, we struggle to find the right words to pray. Here are some words to speak into the darkness.

"Keep watch, dear Lord, with those who work, or watch, or weep this night, and give your angels charge over those who sleep. Tend the sick, Lord Christ; give rest to the weary, bless the dying, soothe the suffering, pity the afflicted, shield the joyous; and all for your love's sake. Amen."



Gustavo Parajón (1935-2011) could have been a successful medical doctor in the United States. Instead, he moved his young family to Nicaragua and served the people of his home country.

During his lifetime, he was many things to many people. He was a medical doctor who launched a campaign to rid his country of many common diseases. Following the massive 1972 earthquake that crumbled Managua, Nicaragua, Gustavo gathered church leaders and together they developed a program that would have a deep and lasting impact on the poor of their country. When First Baptist Church of Managua found itself without a pastor; Gustavo filled the vacancy. During Nicaragua's civil unrest (1978-1989) he visited insurgents and Government leaders alike to promote peace; always traveling without bodyguards. During the armed conflict in Nicaragua, the Parajón family welcomed refugees into their home from either side of their nation's conflict.



Security and Safety Awareness Month Prairie Homestead Senior Living

- **5**. Consider a medical alert system and fall monitoring device. Multiple companies offer pendants that can be pushed for immediate support. Systems can range from a small coverage area, such as inside the house, or expanded to wherever you are thru a GPS system. This safety device is especially helpful for those living alone.

PLANNED GIVING THANK YOU

You may or may not know that, like everything else, we use computer software to process charitable gift annuities and other gifts for the Kansas Baptist Convention Foundation. Our software provider is PG Calc, which is headquartered in Cambridge, Massachusetts. I was very excited because I had the opportunity to attend a free webinar with the company in January on the Legacy IRA Act. The leader of the webinar was Kara Morin, Director of Client Services.

The Legacy IRA Act was included in the large omnibus bill that was passed by Congress last year. The actual spending bill was 4000 pages long and this was a part of that legislation.

I learned so much and I will give an overview of what she shared with us:

The act allows a person who is 70 years old or older to take a QCD or qualified charitable deduction from a traditional IRA and convert it into a charitable gift annuity or charitable trust. Since my focus is on charitable gift annuities, I will speak to that, but if you have other questions, please let me know.

The reason they call it the Legacy IRA act is that you can only do it once in a lifetime.

Each donor is allowed to move \$50,000 from their IRA to a CGA, and if you are a couple, you can each move \$50,000 for a total of \$100,000 to a charitable gift annuity. As an individual, you also have the option of funding two \$25,000 gift annuities that would total \$50,000. If you use less than the \$50,000 limit, the rest of the amount is forfeited and, of course, you cannot go over the \$50,000 limit.

You can only do this with a qualified charitable deduction from an IRA. There are no other combinations available, and you can't add anything later. All QCD payments are taxed as ordinary income and there is no income tax deduction for them.

Still, there are benefits! It allows you a tax-free withdrawal from your IRA and it counts toward your RMD or required minimum distribution. If you are a donor, who does not itemize deductions, it offers you a deduction comparable to a charitable deduction. By turning this into a charitable gift annuity, you turn variable income into fixed income for yourself and/or your spouse.

BETHEL NEIGHBORHOOD CENTER -MULTIPURPOSE CENTER PROJECT

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ!

We are very excited to share the status of the second phase of our expansion project with you and others in our churches. Construction of our activity and multipurpose center is in full swing! Last November, the ground preparation began and now the building foundation is being poured. So many of our children and families we serve tell us **how** happy they are to see Bethel Center, the place where they feel love and support, is now being expanded to provide a larger space for them to have fellowship, learn new things, exercise and promote healthy behaviors and lifestyles. We sincerely thank our community of faith for your continued support of the Bethel ministry. Your partnership with Bethel continues to allow us to provide programs and services that help to transform lives in our community.

We hired the Miller Stauch Construction Company to build our new multipurpose center. We hit an obstacle, unfortunately, and we are hopeful that your church will help us overcome it. We must raise an additional \$800,000 to finish the construction of the new center due to circumstances beyond our control. The original construction budget prepared by our architectural firm was too low as labor and construction costs have gone up very high within the last two years.

Unfortunately, we started the second phase of the expansion project in one of the highest-inflated construction markets experienced in decades. As a result, we were forced to increase the construction budget to reflect the following:

- · Inflation
- · Energy Cost Increases
- · Labor Shortage
- · Material Cost Increases
- · Supply Chain Disruptions
- · General Contractor Coverage



All of this had an impact and continues to have an impact on the costs to complete the construction of the multipurpose and activities center.

Your consideration and continued funding support for this project are requested and will be greatly appreciated. Dr. Mang Sonna, the Bethel Board of Directors, staff, volunteers, and those in the communities we serve acknowledge the generosity of our churches and its members. Without your support, many of the services we provide could not have been achieved.

Your support is creating a brighter future for so many children, families and Seniors who find HOPE at Bethel. We can't say thank you enough!





Dwight is training partners in Central America in rainwater harvesting, installing model systems, and encouraging the use of this water-collection method in addressing the severe water crises throughout the region.



Toya Richards: She is endorsed to serve in Cape Town, South Africa as a teacher and professor at the Cape Town Baptist Seminary – a ministry of IM partner the Baptist Union of Southern Africa. Drawing upon her extensive career and experience in print journalism and communications, Toya will teach intermediate to advanced English language skills and research methodology, preparing students to meet the demands and requirements needed for advanced seminary studies. She will also be involved in emerging community initiatives through the CTBS Center for Biblical Justice. Toya is currently building her Mission Partnership Team and raising the funds needed to begin her ministry in South Africa.



Debbie and Keith Myers: They serve in Central Mexico. They partner with the Council of Rural Indigenous Evangelicals of Mexico, AR, to provide pastoral accompaniment to the indigenous churches. This consists of training pastors, church leaders, youth leaders, and teachers for the children. Debbie and Keith serve in four states in Mexico and work with 34 churches within these states to empower the people.


