

The Antioch Center at Central Seminary is both a place and a calling. Geographically, it stands near the intersection of Antioch Road and 110th Street in Overland Park, Kansas—a crossroads where people, communities, and stories meet. Spiritually and theologically, it draws its name and purpose from the city of Antioch, the first great crossroads church, where diverse believers were gathered, formed, and sent into the world. In Antioch, the followers of Jesus were first called Christians, and from that place of learning, prayer, and shared leadership, the church was commissioned for mission beyond familiar boundaries.

Like its biblical namesake, the Antioch Center is grounded in the conviction that faithful ministry is forged at intersections—between tradition and change, local context and global vision, formation and action. It is a place where congregations pause to listen, learn, and discern together, drawing strength from community and clarity from shared purpose. Theologically, the Center embodies a sending posture, equipping lay leaders, congregations, and pastors to respond creatively and courageously to where the Spirit is leading next. Standing at a literal crossroads, the Antioch Center is spiritually located in the space where formation meets mission, where diverse voices are welcomed, and where the church is continually renewed for the sake of the world.

The Antioch Center will advance congregational vitality for both lay leaders and pastors through the creation of robust educational opportunities and practical resources tailored to today's diverse church contexts. The Center will offer a wide range of programming, including short webinars, certificate programs, and customized tools designed especially for small, rural, and multilingual congregations across the Midwest. Existing certificate programs—such as the Certificate in Chaplaincy and the Certificate in Peace and Justice—will be integrated into the work of the Center and evaluated for impact, while new certificates will be developed in response to emerging needs. The Antioch Center will also provide expert guidance and congregational coaching for both lay leaders and clergy on critical issues such as fragile church finances and outdated accounting systems, stewardship of large and aging facilities, mental health challenges within congregations and surrounding communities, accessibility and inclusion for people with disabilities, and innovative outreach strategies to engage youth and young adults.



These offerings will be supported by adaptive, multilingual learning platforms that deliver culturally responsive resources and foster coached learning communities.

The Antioch Center will also serve as a hub for comprehensive lay leadership training that equips leaders to serve effectively in their unique ministry contexts. Existing programs at Central Seminary—including the Hispanic Lay Institute (Spanish), the Judson Communities Certificate Program (Burmese and Karen), and the Ola Hanson Bible Institute (Kachin)—will be supported and expanded. In addition, a new English-language lay leadership training will be developed and delivered. Building on this foundation, the Center will launch Lay Leader Communities of Practice, cohort-based learning experiences designed to meet the distinct needs of various denominations, cultural communities, and shared affinities.

Finally, The Antioch Center will expand and deepen partnerships with denominations that directly serve congregations, recognizing collaboration as essential to sustainable impact. The Center will work closely with denominational partners to co-create relevant content and support recruitment, while also convening regional gatherings to engage denominational leaders and host targeted listening sessions. Insights gained from these conversations and shared data will guide the identification of emerging congregational needs, shape flexible engagement strategies, and strengthen partnerships, ensuring that the Center's work remains responsive, collaborative, and grounded in the lived realities of congregations.

The Antioch Center will begin its work in spring 2026 with a three-part Congregational Learning Series designed to address pressing challenges facing churches today:

Since I live in Kansas City, the home of an international card corporation, when I think of the month of February I usually think of Valentine's Day. For some people, their Valentine is their husband or wife, their spouse, their boyfriend or girlfriend or a significant other. Others might include someone such as a son or daughter, favorite aunt or uncle, beloved niece or nephew or even a cousin. Some people might consider a close or trusted friend as their Valentine or even a four-legged family member or another pet as their Valentine.

Over the years many "Valentines" and their spouses have funded charitable gift annuities for each other, meaning that whether they were the husband or the wife in the couple, they didn't just choose themselves as the beneficiary of the annuity, but they chose their spouse as a beneficiary along with them.

Having officiated a good number of weddings over the years, I know that many brides and grooms promise to love, honor and cherish each other in their vows. Still there are other things that they promise to do that are unwritten or unspoken in their vows. In my way of thinking, a couple of those unspoken promises are to protect and provide for each other.

That makes me think of a real and true love story that began around 60 years ago. I have mentioned before that my mom was one of eight Irish-American girls, and her youngest sister is named Rita. My Aunt Rita Janice Armstrong Cearlock is my only living aunt on both sides of the family and I visited her in Springfield, Illinois, on my way back here from Christmas vacation.

As we all know each child in a family has his or her own character, spirit and personality. That said, my mom and my Aunt Rita were totally different people even though they were sisters born 10 years apart. My mom was a fairly easy going, agreeable, adaptable and talkative lady. My Aunt Rita is a woman with grit, determination, spunk & chutzpah and talkative also. It's an Armstrong trait!

Back in the days of the TV series, "Mad Men", my Aunt Rita went to professional beauty school in Chicago and became a licensed beautician and cosmetologist, when it took a lot more training to receive that title! Some of you will remember that those were the days when women wore the big "Beehive" hairdos, etc. After a couple of years in training, she moved back to Springfield and began her career. That's when she met my uncle "Cooch", whose full name was Cecil Clyde Cearlock and they were married in February, 1969, at the catholic cathedral in Springfield. Like any other married couple, when they took those vows, they had no idea what they were promising, but they were faithful to each other and they did protect and provide for each other till the end.

My uncle Cooch was a printer by trade and worked very hard to provide for their family along with my Aunt Rita, who was a beautician out of their home for nearly 50 years. They raised two sons, Chris, who served two tours in Iraq, and Vince, who is a Washington DC capitol policeman, working in a K9 unit.

In the mid to late 1980s, my uncle was diagnosed with ALS and had to retire from printing and his health insurance ended then, so my Aunt Rita, who was a trained beautician, got a job at the Jewel grocery store in town as a baker, so she could have good health insurance and provide for and protect her husband! Now it's one thing to bake at home and it's another to run a commercial bakery in a grocery store, but Aunt Rita was trained very well and she was the morning person, who opened the bakery and got everything prepared for the first shift of the day. She worked that job for many years to provide and protect her husband just as he had done the same for her in the years that he was a printer.


I went and visited them a couple of times during his ALS Journey and it was a difficult sight to see, but I was glad that I made myself go and spend time with them. My uncle Cooch ended up dying in the fall of 1992 and all of our family gathered in Springfield to honor him as a World War II Navy veteran and for his life of faith well lived as a son, brother, husband, father, uncle, etc. Even after he died, my Aunt Rita continued working at the bakery in the grocery store because she loved it and the job provided well for her. With her boys grown into adult men, she continued that work and also her work as a beautician as well.

She has been happily retired for years now and is living in an assisted living facility, but she is still in good shape and as sharp as a tack. She always shares many wonderful stories about my mom's family that I have never heard before.

While many think that one spouse is the person to be the protector and provider, I think that both spouses are given that opportunity and can do it well like my Aunt Rita and Uncle Cooch.

If you are a married couple then you can do that as well. You can protect and provide for your spouse by funding a charitable gift annuity for both of you, when you choose yourselves as the beneficiaries. Since the rate of return is based on your age, and if you are older, you can lock in a good rate through the annuity that will provide for you for the rest of your lives. Then if one of you goes home to be with the Lord, the other spouse will still receive the returns from the annuity for the rest of your life. That is a gift of both of you providing for and protecting each other as you continue in your love relationship and grow older in life. The annuity provides money for you for the rest of your life and protects you from going without. While the real gift of love is living together and sharing life through all the years, this is a financial gift of love that protects and provides for each other.

If you are a married couple and you wish to fund what is called a "two lives" gift annuity, please get a hold of me and I will be happy to help you with that. Even if you are not a married couple, but a single person and you are interested in funding a charitable gift annuity that would protect and provide for yourself as well, please contact me by phone, email or in person at one of our retreats and conferences, and I will be ready and willing to help you in that process. Please also remember that you have the opportunity to choose the mission agency, partner or offering that the remainder of your gift will go to when Jesus welcomes you into the heavenly realm. 

Rev. Soozie Whitten Ford served as Executive Minister with the American Baptist Churches of Indiana and Kentucky for more than nine years, retiring in 2021. Ford's previous ministry experiences include faculty positions with Sterling College (Sterling KS) and Central Baptist Theological Seminary (Shawnee KS); pastoral positions with First Baptist Church (Casper WY) and Calvary Baptist Church (Cheyenne WY); regional ministry with Mid-American Baptist Churches (Iowa and Minnesota); and national stewardship ministry with American Baptist Churches USA. International mission experiences have included opportunities to preach and teach, and work alongside local leaders, in Nicaragua, Honduras, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, Northeast India, the Ukraine, Hungary, and South Africa. She is a graduate of Ottawa University and Central Baptist Theological Seminary and was ordained by Prairie Baptist Church (Prairie Village KS).

In the post-retirement chapter of her ministry, Rev. Soozie Whitten Ford served the Office of the General Secretary ABCUSA as the (interim) Associate General Secretary for Regional Ministries. At the same time, she served in a volunteer position as the Special Assistant to the Executive Director of International Ministries, Rev. Dr. Sharon Koh, in the role of Chaplain.

Throughout her ministry journey, Ford served on numerous teams, task forces, and boards – at local, regional and national levels. Included among those are terms on the boards of the Nehemiah Leadership Network; the American Baptist Homes of the Midwest; Green Lake Conference Center (as Vice Chair); and the American Baptist Women in Ministry Advisory Team. Along with Dr. Tom Wiles, she co-chaired the 2022 conference, Radical. Redeemed. Ready: Celebrating Ministering Women.

Homer Ford (most recently retired as the pastor of First Baptist Church, Franklin IN) for over forty years, and together they have two daughters, a son-in-law, and a granddaughter. 
