Recently one of our donors, who has funded a couple of charitable gift annuities previously, asked me if the gift annuity rates were going up? I responded "no" because they are not going up at this point in time.

Some people may wonder if the interest rates for charitable gift annuities are connected to the interest rate from the Federal Reserve Bank of the United States? They are not connected. The Federal Reserve board meets eight times a year, considering aspects of our national economy and then decides whether to raise interest rates, lower interest rates or do what they did at this past meeting. They did not change the interest rates this time so they kept them stable at between 4.25% and 4.5%. Now if you were investing in a commercial annuity, that would generally be affected by the work of the Federal Reserve, but not with a charitable gift annuity.

As you will remember from reading previous articles that I have written, a charitable gift annuity is not the same as a commercial annuity. It is a split interest gift. What that means is that a portion of the gift donated goes to the beneficiary each year for the rest of their life and the remaining portion or the residuum goes to the charity or mission partners of the donor's choice. You can fund a gift annuity, but the interest rate depends on the age of the beneficiary, which is the person receiving the financial gift each year. A donor could choose himself or herself as a beneficiary and if they are a couple who decide to fund a gift annuity for themselves, then there is a separate interest rate for two lives, which is based on a second rate table. If the donor chooses to fund the gift annuity and wants the gift to go to another family member or friend, then the interest rate depends on their age.

So, for example, if you are 75 years old and wish to fund a gift annuity, choosing yourself as the beneficiary, then the interest rate for you would be 7.0%. If you are age 76, then the interest rate would be 7.2% and if you are 77 years old, then the interest rate would be 7.4% and so on and so on. Also, just so you understand, if you are funding a gift annuity and the beneficiary is a child instead whose age is between 5 and 11 years old then the interest rate for them would be 3.8%.

For many years, charities and nonprofits set their own interest rates for charitable gift annuities, but in 1927 the American Council on Gift Annuities was formed and it became a 501c3 non-profit in 1993. The council on gift annuities sets the interest rates for charitable gift annuities in our nation. The council does change the rates from time to time based on economic factors but they do not change them regularly or often like the Federal Reserve does. The rate model has historically tended to suggest a rate change no more frequently then once every one or two years.

So while the rates are not going up right now, the good news is that as you grow older and wiser and more mature, the rates do go up. That is one benefit or perk to aging! So whether you are 18 or 81 years old, you can fund a charitable gift annuity that will financially bless you for the rest of your life and provide a generous gift to a church, ministry, missionary or other mission partner of your choice.

If this is something you wish to do, please contact me at your earliest convenience and I will be happy to help you fund a charitable gift annuity. The minimum amount required is \$1,000, but you can give much more than that if you so desire. Please call, email, text or leave me a voicemail and I will be delighted to assist you with your wonderful gift!

That list of resolutions that I made up earlier was just a standard list of many things that people want to change. Still, if you are interested in the last two items on the list, I can help you with that. If you wish to fund a charitable gift annuity in this new year, I can assist you in that way. The benefits of funding a charitable gift annuity are at least three fold or triune, in my opinion. If you want to fund a gift annuity with \$1,000, \$10,000 or even \$100,000, then you can receive those three benefits or blessings. Just to be clear you can give any amount you wish, but the minimum gift is \$1,000.

The first is that a portion of the gift comes back to you, if you list yourself as the beneficiary. You can also include your spouse in that as well, which is called a two-life annuity. Based on the amount of the gift and the age or ages of the beneficiaries, a certain percentage of this split interest gift comes back to you in a payment that you will receive till the end of your life.

The second benefit will help you accomplish your resolution to give more money to missions and the church because you can choose the mission partners that your remainder amount will help when the Lord calls you home. These mission partners can include your home church, another church, a variety of offerings and a myriad of mission partners including American Baptist institutions, our Home Mission Society, International Ministries and individual missionaries that serve around the globe through I M.

The third benefit will help you accomplish that last item on the resolution list, which is to save on taxes. You will receive an income tax deduction based on the amount given to fund the gift annuity that corresponds to the remainder amount given to the mission partners of your choice. This amount is calculated by our planned giving software. Also, if you have appreciated stock and wish to use that to fund a charitable gift annuity, not only will you receive an income tax deduction, but you will receive a capital gains tax deduction based upon the amount of stock that you are using to fund the annuity. So that could be a win-win situation for you as well!

I guess there is really a fourth benefit as well because you will receive the satisfaction, joy and good feeling of knowing that you have helped a variety of mission partners to care for others and announce the good news of God's Kingdom, Jesus' love and the Holy Spirit's presence to help many more people become a part of the family of God!
