VUCA? What's VUCA?

VUCA: Volatile, Uncertainty, Complexity, and Ambiguity changed my life! The COVID virus disrupted many lives. But, did it also disrupt your church? My church?

In the fall of 2020, the church I attend joined the ReShaping Church initiative to support the " thriving congregations" resource of Central Seminary in partnership with Pinnacle Leadership Associates and sponsored by Lilly Endowment Inc. The introductory information came from the Central Region office and emails.

Introducing the initiative was the first step, but I also had to introduce myself. I learned many new details and traits of my church friends. I began to understand why some felt one way and others felt another way. One quote that sticks with me from the first lesson states, "We change when the pain of staying the same exceeds the pain of changing". My group, led by Rev. Bill Hendricks, Interim Minister at the time, took on the HARD events in my church that had left me feeling uncertain and lost.

Of course, the outbreak of COVID was the most challenging to me. I couldn't hold my 2-year-old twin grandsons anymore. I couldn't worship in person with my church family, since all worship services went fully online. Because everyone in America was encouraged to stay at home, all informal meetings and greetings, all hugs and high-fives ceased. I became lonely for others. I missed my grandchildren, I missed my friends, especially my churchfriends. While going through all of this, the staff resigned. The pastor resigned first, and then the worship team. My heart broke, and I didn'tknow what to do with the VUCA in my life. I didn't even know what VUCA meant until the I

my life. I didn't even know what VUCA meant until the ReShape initiative was launched! Learning and using the ReShape information changed my life! I am so grateful that Rev. MINISTRY IN ACTION

3D RESURRECTION Rev. Dr. Gregg Hemmen, Executive Minister

Imagine it's a Sunday evening about the year 30. Earlier that day, rumors swirled about the most bizarre event ever. If rumors proved true, everything people knew would now be different. As the sun begins to set, two followers of Jesus are walking away from Jerusalem toward Emmaus. These two had been followers of Jesus for quite a while but now as they walk, they are perplexed and saddened. They hoped Jesus would save them from pagan domination. But instead, he was put to death in the most violent way people can treat one another – crucifixion.

While they walk, a stranger joins them. He smoothly merges into the conversation and it's obvious these two Jesus followers are distraught. One can't blame these two for being a little suspicious of the stranger because after what has happened in the last few days, everyone is on edge. They keep scanning their surroundings as if they're waiting for someone to jump out of the bushes and attack. As the trio moves farther away from Jerusalem, the tension eases and the two followers talk more openly with the stranger about their own hopes and dreams for the one who was crucified.

Gradually, this stranger reframes the whole discussion. He describes the history of their people in ways that are fresh and new. He adds Technicolor and a 3-D perspective to a narrative that has always been black and white. As this stranger tells familiar stories of their Jewish identity in a new way, it's as if these two followers of Jesus have been looking through the wrong end of a pair of binoculars. Everything was far away and blurry. Now, the way this stranger tells the story, everything is suddenly up close and clear.

As they got close to Emmaus, the two followers don't want the conversation to end so they invite the stranger for supper. As they recline around a table, the stranger takes a loaf of bread, breaks it apart, prays for the meal, and shares it with his new friends.

Suddenly, their eyes were opened and they knew. This wasn't a stranger after all. There was a peculiar attractiveness about this stranger that neither one of the followers could put their finger on. But in a single moment after wrestling and processing all that happened, this stranger was someone who not only knew their collective story, but knew them as individuals. Resurrection wasn't just a hope any more, it was a reality. They both saw him! Brokenness in life wasn't so hopeless anymore. Dead dreams became resuscitated hope. And just as quickly as this stranger merged into their conversation along the road, he disappeared.

Only Luke tells us this amazing story but it has become a paradigm for all of us. You and I are those two followers walking along trying to make sense of our lives and the events that come at us. We are often talking and discussing, yet not really seeing. We are often spinning our wheels in disappointment, wondering who or what might offer us the traction we desire to get unstuck. And maybe the most troublesome of all is that we have interpreted our stories in black and white, lacking color, redemption, and quite frankly life itself!

I've told this story many times and heard it even more. I've both heard the story dissected and cut it up into all kinds of empty pursuits myself. Where exactly is Emmaus? Are the Cleopas of Luke 24 and the Clopas of John 19:25 the same person? If so, that makes the followers on the road to Emmaus husband and wife and what does that mean? Does it really matter?!!! I think you get the idea. We can strip this biblical story of its power, complicate it, and add to it in ways where we too will miss Jesus just like the two who were walking to Emmaus.

What are we left with then? We are left with a story of resurrection that is meant for our ears. It's a story that we are to hear with our own ears for our own lives. If we're only hearing this story because we think the person beside us needs to hear it, Jesus will not just be the stranger on the road to Emmaus, but he'll be a stranger sitting among us right now and we won't notice him any more than his two followers did.

The story of this resurrected Jesus is for us so that we'll have a "holy aha!" in our lives too. I'll speak only for myself in this but these two Jesus followers on the road to Emmaus are my soul mates because I'm just as foolish and slow of heart as they were. There's a resurrected Jesus on the loose in our neighborhoods and if you believe that, it changes everything! But does it in my life? Does it in yours? Shouldn't it change the way we spend our money and how we treat our neighbor? Shouldn't it change what we think is important in this church and dissolve some of our stubborn ways? I think so and while I'm not there yet, I think I know the direction I'm supposed to go. Do you?

The Australian philosopher Ivan Illich said it best when he wrote, "Neither revolution nor reformation can ultimately change a society, rather you must tell a new powerful tale, one so persuasive that it sweeps away the old myths and becomes the preferred story...If you want to change a society, then you have to tell an alternative story." We have that alternative story. Jesus was killed for us. It doesn't matter what you've done, God offers you forgiveness. God sees you through the eyes of love and offers you a new life that's yours for the taking. All you're asked to do is believe. That's not black and white. It's not a formula. It's a 3D Technicolor Jesus tale. Will you believe it and retell it?

I don't know if you are aware of it or not, but the Kansas Baptist Convention Foundation is turning 65 years old this year and that is something to celebrate! For 65 years the foundation has been giving churches, individuals and our region the opportunity to invest in the foundation and leave a legacy for future generations of American Baptists in Kansas and Oklahoma.

Still, what does it mean to leave a legacy? A simple definition of the word is

"something that is passed on." Now as far as the foundation is concerned, this would mean money that would be passed on to churches, institutions and mission partners, both locally, throughout our region and nationally. This could include ABHMS and IM, which supports our missionaries all around the globe, who have worked hard to do their own fundraising, but also could enjoy the blessing of a monetary legacy that comes from the Kansas Baptist Convention Foundation! Just to be exhaustive, there are other agencies, national ABC–USA organizations and offerings that could also benefit from a monetary legacy. Yet, there are other ways to leave a legacy as well including your faith, ethics, core values and also your character, reputation and the life that you live or have lived. A legacy can also come through your family including your children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren and beyond. While many might see that as the most important legacy, I want to mention one more, which would be a home, building, monument or statue.

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While I hope to touch on this more in future articles, I want to speak to you today about one example of a legacy. My father, J Fred Schwartz, who was a farmer in West Central Illinois, in an area that abutted the Mississippi River just across from Hannibal, Missouri, decided that he wanted to leave a legacy to the city of Hannibal, which is not only the home of Samuel Langhorne Clemens, but also of Cliff Edwards, Margaret Tobin– otherwise known as "Molly Brown" and Bill Lear, who was credited with inventing the car radio, the Lear jet and the 8-track tape player!! (I know many of you are googling now!)

You might be asking the question," why would my dad want to leave a legacy for the city of Hannibal?" That is because, when he was in high school, the Hull, Illinois, high school burned to the ground and because of that the good people of Hannibal, Missouri, offered to let the students from that district attend Hannibal High School for a number of years until the new high school was built in Kinderhook, Illinois, in 1951. Even though a country high school can provide a good education, my dad thought that he got a better education and the opportunity to participate in the Future Farmers of America, while attending Hannibal High School and that was a substantial educational gift to him and his classmates!


That's part of the reason why he wanted to give the statue of a young Mark Twain at the pilot's wheel to the city of Hannibal to be placed in the riverfront park along the Mississippi.

So he consulted with Mark Twain experts, professors and museum directors to find a photo or image to base the statue on. My father chose a photo of a young Mark Twain wearing a pompadour hairstyle with mutton chops on the side of his face. (You can see this in the photo below.) After their advising, through other connections and help, he was able to work with an artist In Taiwan, who made a mock-up of it and later it was cast and sculpted there and shipped across to California. Then a very good LDS friend of his, Keith Mackay, paid for the statue and the stone base to be shipped to Hannibal on a train.

It was dedicated on July 4th, 2003, and my father wanted me to be there to give the opening prayer with my sister, Rev. Mary Armstrong Reiner. While I wanted to be there, the only problem is I was serving as a missionary and an English teacher in Thailand and we were in the middle of the school year because the Thai schools begin near the end of May and conclude in February! So I had to get an official letter from the mayor of the city of Hannibal, Missouri, so I could get permission from the principal to come home for one week for the dedication and thanks be to God that it all worked out!

Most of us are not planning to give a statue as our legacy, but you are doing other important things to leave a substantial legacy to your family, church and community! I know by experience that many of you have your Investments, trusts and wills in order so that you are ready when the Lord calls you home. However, if you or anyone else wishes to leave a legacy through a charitable gift annuity from the foundation, please contact me by email, text, phone call, voicemail, etc and I will be happy to help you in funding a gift annuity and leaving another part of your legacy to your church, region, mission partners or offerings that will sustain and strengthen the gospel ministry for many years to come!

Age is determined by what grade the student is entering in the fall of 2024. High school students who graduate in 2024 are still eligible to attend high school camp. Exceptions can be made at the discretion of the director.
