During his last few earthly days in the hospital, a therapy dog was making rounds and Bill's whole disposition brightened when he got to see this new canine friend.

Please keep Bill's wife, Jacki, in your prayers. Bill and Jacki were married over 50 years and there will be lots of transitions for her. We will also be making adjustments in the Region Office to cover Bill's responsibilities and would appreciate your prayers for that adjustment as well.

#### **REBALANCING LIFE: EMBRACING HOLY LEISURE** Rev. Dr. Gregg Hemmen, Executive Minister

Not long ago, I came back from a few weeks of vacation where I spent some time in Iowa helping with the corn harvest. Yes, I know it sounds a bit odd and a number of people have called me out on "working" on my vacation. But it really does aid the recharging of my inner batteries. While in the tractor hauling loads of corn, I spent time thinking about my sabbatical, which is scheduled for the fall of 2025. For several months at the end of 2025, I'll cease from my normal rhythms and do some continuing education and rest. I've taken part in some different continuing education opportunities before so that won't be anything new. In many ways, that's the easy part. The rest aspect of this sabbatical is what scares me a bit. Do I even know how to rest without being restless? Before I go any further, I am grateful that the Central Region provides the benefit of sabbaticals. But again, I'm facing this gift with apprehension.

Like most of you, I'm well aware of the work-rest design we have received from God. There's both a short term cycle (weekly on the 7th day; Exodus 20:8-11) and a longer-term cycle (7th year; Leviticus 25:4-5) laid out for us in Scripture. Rest on the 7th day and reset life in the 7th year. I'll commend God for a good plan! I've encouraged pastors and others to pay attention to their needs for rest. Sit at the feet of Jesus, and soak in this Godly life we are called to model. Now my own words are staring back at me and I'll admit I'm a little scared.

I know the analogy breaks down quickly but it's been helpful for me to think about these shorter and longer term activities of sabbath/sabbatical as being similar to rebalancing the tires on my car. If you want your tires to last their longest, you need to periodically rebalance and rotate them. That helps to prevent premature wear and failure. So that's what I'll try and do.

I was sharing with my cousin, the farmer I help each fall, about my upcoming sabbatical and he asked, "So you're looking for another job for several months next fall?" I was obviously not explaining the concept of sabbatical very well but in many ways it will be like taking on a new job next fall. And it may very well be the hardest work I've ever done.

A well-known pastor was consulting a psychologist about a new spiritual formation initiative and this psychologist said, "Most people are just too busy to live emotionally healthy and spiritually vibrant lives." We equate busyness with value and importance. And because we want to be valued by others, we fill our lives with commitments, meetings, activities, and opportunities that are generally good by themselves, but when stacked on top of one another, they have thrown our lives dangerously out of balance to the point where we are in danger of flying apart. Now, I don't think I'm on the verge of flying apart. But most who make such confident assertions, are often the last ones to see the debris field forming in their lives.

So, I'm doing the best I can to prepare for this time of resetting my life. My mentor has put me in touch with some experts who help leaders of nonprofit organizations and I hope to broaden and sharpen my skill set. There's a class on nonprofit leadership for the 21st century that I plan on taking. Those will be the easy things. Most importantly, I'm planning on some extended time where I simply sit at the feet of Jesus. Jesus said to some followers in John 1, "Come and see." He was inviting them to step further into the life he was living. That's what I most want to do, what I most need, and what scares me the most because I'm not always sure how to get there.

One of my seminary professors taught me a Latin phrase that is often attributed to Augustine. The phrase is "otium sanctum." The dignified translation into English is, "holy leisure." The raw translation is, "wasting time with God." I generally choose the raw translation because it grates against my bent toward efficiency and usefulness. It stretches me more and that stretching is what I most need. So I'm going to try and "waste" some time with Jesus this next year and if successful, it will be the best investment in myself that I've ever made.

Well the big day is finally here because on December 2nd, 1959, the Kansas Baptist Convention Foundation was incorporated for the next 100 years. We are observing our 65th birthday during this month and that is a milestone to celebrate!! Even though we are turning 65, we are not retiring, slowing down or concluding our work. We are supremely grateful for all of our annuitants, both current and those who have gone before us and we thank you for trusting us with your money to invest! We are also thankful for the many churches that have invested with the foundation as well and we appreciate your gifts and your faith in the work that the foundation does! We are also very appreciative of our board, accountants and our investment team as well!

During the past 5 months, I have been sharing stories of annuitants, who have been an important part of our first 65 years, but I am going to take a break from that this month since we are celebrating our birthday.

Just in case you were wanting to give us a birthday gift, I wanted to make you aware of two ways to do that. Both of these ways are unusual in that not only does the foundation receive a birthday gift, if you do it in honor of our birthday this month, but you will receive a gift as well. Now, how about that!! I don't know of too many ways to do that, but you can do that by investing in a charitable gift annuity. When you fund a charitable gift annuity, and you choose the beneficiary or beneficiaries, a portion of your gift goes to them. Usually someone will choose himself or herself as the beneficiary or if you wish to choose two beneficiaries, much of the time the person chooses themself and their spouse to receive the funds from the charitable gift annuity. Based on the amount given and the age of the beneficiaries for the rest of their life. Even though you have given the gift, we can still say that it is the gift that keeps on giving until the Lord calls you to your eternal home.

Just to clarify, the first way of funding a charitable gift annuity is through a gift of cash or appreciated stock. This is the most common way that gift annuities are funded and the Kansas Baptist Convention Foundation has been using this first way all throughout its 65 years so far.

Still there is a second way to fund a charitable gift annuity, which comes through the SECURE 2.0 act that was a part of the US House 2023 Omnibus Appropriations bill. It involves a QCD roll-over from your IRA to fund a CGA. Some just might refer to it as alphabet soup, but I don't think so!

Under the SECURE 2.0 Act, if you are a person aged 70.5 years and you have an IRA, you can transfer a qualified charitable distribution of up to 53,000 to a charitable gift annuity with a 501c3, such as the Kansas Baptist Convention Foundation. You must contact your IRA plan administrator and ask for a QCD transfer to the nonprofit in order to form a charitable gift annuity, and you will fill out paper or electronic forms to get that done. The money from the QCD must be transferred directly from the IRA to fund the CGA, thereby allowing you the opportunity to pay no federal income tax on that QCD that becomes a charitable gift annuity. The original amount of the QCD was \$50,000, but because of inflation it is \$53,000 this year and if you have a spouse, each of you can contribute \$53,000 through the QCD for a total of \$106,000. Also, one last thing, you can only do this once in your lifetime!

For more information you can go to the ABCCR website and click on KBCF and there are three pages of information there or you can go to irs.gov and search for information on QCDs and you will find it there. As always, consult your financial and tax advisor or your attorney before making these decisions.

Thanks for coming along with me this past year on the KBCF 65th birthday journey. 




