Bound Together with Cheese Crackers and Capri Sun

In October our 2022-2023 4Ten leadership group met at Camp White Memorial in Council Grove, Kansas. Associate Executive Minister, Jennifer Schneider, Davey Kiker, and myself are blessed to be able to walk alongside these students to pour into them and teach them to use their gifts to serve the body of Christ. Throughout the weekend they studied leaders in the Bible and discussed the attributes that made them leaders, they worked together to get through the low ropes course, and they also planned their own worship service for Sunday morning.

The students examined what their worship services looked like and discussed the elements they wanted to add to their own service. One of the aspects of service they decided they wanted to incorporate was communion. We didn't have the traditional wafer and grape juice, so they decided on cheese crackers and a Capri-Sun. It may seem silly, but this was possibly one of my favorite acts of communion I've participated in.

While sitting in front of the lake watching students lead each other in worship I thought about how communion is not about the bread and juice; it's about the body and blood of Jesus that bind us together. It's not about the ritual or the method; it's about listening to Jesus and doing what He says. Communion is not an obligation, but a celebration. Many of us sing "Blest be the Tie That Binds" after partaking in communion. There is joy to be found in the sacrifice of Jesus Christ; that joy comes from being bound in love through Him. We come together in community to celebrate what Jesus has done for us. Communion is a time when we collectively reflect on the covenant that binds us together.

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RETHINKING INNOVATION

I was reading an article from Dr. Jolene Erlacher the other day. The article was titled "How Can You Rethink Innovation?" Dr. Erlacher was last fall's keynote speaker at our ABCCR region annual gathering. She is the founder of Leading Tomorrow and desires to help churches, businesses, schools, and other organizations encourage effective intergenerational leadership. In this article, she was encouraging her readers to think about innovation.

As I was reading her words, I kept thinking about how we have been forced to innovate over the last few years. The pandemic pushed all of us to think about ministry in new ways. Some days I get tired of trying to create new programs, plans, and processes. I want things to "be like they used to be." It is often more comfortable to fall back on tried-and-true formulas.

Yet, as I ponder the beginning of a new calendar year, I can't help but think about all the possibilities this new year will bring. There will be opportunities to try some things differently. New people will enter our lives, and our church families will have chances to create spaces for new ideas.

According to Erlacher, young leaders are wired to innovate. She suggests young leaders are "more likely to question" assumptions and to challenge current ways of doing things." If we want to share the gospel with new generations, we need the help of our young leaders. They have grown up in a world where things never stay the same but are constantly evolving.

Dr. Erlacher quoted futurist Alvin Toffler in her article. He stated, "The illiterate of the twenty-first century will not be those who cannot read and write, but those who cannot learn, unlearn, and relearn." This is a difficult challenge but one we can't afford to ignore. As people of faith, we must be willing to deconstruct our past programs and processes to decide what is valuable and what must be let go of. This will allow us to adapt to our changing world constantly.

However, thankfully we can trust in the one who never changes. In Micah 7:7, we find these words: "But for me, I will look to the Lord, I will wait for the God of my salvation; my God will hear me." (NRSV). As we seek to learn, change, and

grow, may we trust that God is ever faithful.



PASTOR BILL HENDRICKS


John, from Ft. Scott, Ks asked:

"What does a pastor really do beside preach on Sunday? How do they keep busy?"

ANSWER: this question comes up regularly during the Search & Call process. No two days are ever the same. Some things are obvious, and others will never be known. The Pastor lives in a world of confession and confidentiality. People rarely see below the line, including the pastor's family.

Some Above the Line Activities:

- ·Plan worship, Preach & lead studies
- ·Visit shut-ins and hospital calls
- Service in Central Region programs
- ·Provide wedding, funeral, and other services
- ·Participate in church board and committee meetings



Each of these activities requires both prayer and preparation. Some require extended time. In addition to prayer, there is content design and the numerous calls and emails that ensure each of these activities are fresh, professional, and well-polished.

Some Below the Line Activities:

- Work in the community and other ecumenical activities
- ·Coaching and counseling (Weddings, marriage, substance abuse)
- ·Handling the drop-ins
- Become a drop-in at: youth group, women's and men's group and children's programs
- ·Tending to the distressed (Drugs, homeless' and those dealing with loss (even pets)
- Intercessory Prayer, study, and professional growth

A pastor works 24 x 7. Cell phones and messaging ensure the pastor is available. Even on their day off, Below the Line Activities capture hours of the pastor time daily. Office hours create some predictability but Below the Line Activities are unpredictable.

How much time is spent weekly? It varies from week to week and pastor to pastor, there is a ballpark summary of hours of how a pastor's time is consumed on the next page...

One thing is certain... a pastor's life is unpredictable. When one reviews the table above, everything is important when it happens. The time required to respond varies from pastor to pastor and church member to church member, but availability is always expected when the need surfaces.

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
