

The ABCCR Annual Gathering for 2022 will be held at Bacone College and Muskogee Civic Center on September 30- October 1 2022. The theme is "Rise Up: Growing in Christ Through All Generations." The theme verse comes from 2 Peter 3:18 "But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be glory both now and forever! Amen."

Annual Gathering will kick-off on September 29 with the Minister's Council dinner. Registration will begin at 9:00am on Friday morning. Dr. Pam Durso will be leading a devotion and the ABW and AB Men lunches will be held before the first session at 1:15pm. A full schedule of events will be made availabe in upcoming publications. Registration forms are included at the end of this paper.

Our keynote speaker is Dr. Jolene Erlacher. Jolene is passionate about equipping the next generation to thrive in their faith and develop as leaders.

Dr. Jolene Erlacher founded Leading Tomorrow in 2014 with the aim of equipping churches, businesses, schools, missions agencies and other organizations for effective inter-generational leadership in an evolving culture. Jolene worked for eight years at North Central University, specializing in leadership training, student development and personnel management. During that time, she identified the need for building awareness of generational differences as young leaders entered the workplace, especially in ministry contexts. This began an extended journey of researching the experiences and needs of Millennials in ministry positions. Her book, Millennials in Ministry (Judson Press) documents her findings.

Jolene's book, Daniel Generation: Godly Leadership in an Ungodly Culture, was released in August 2018, and her new book, Mobilizing Gen Z for Missions will be released in 2022. She specializes in providing training and consulting on team effectiveness and inter-generational leadership, and works with community organizations, government agencies, churches, missions agencies, and small businesses. Jolene teaches continuing education courses for Eduspire. She is also an adjunct faculty member and teaches graduate courses on Organizational Leadership at several universities including North Central University, and serves on the Boards of Directors for The Standards of Excellence in Short-Term Mission.

Jolene's education background includes degrees in Education and English, and a graduate certificate in International Leadership. Her doctorate is in Leadership from the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, MN. She has also completed training on the StrengthsFinder assessment through Gallup Consulting and is a certified IPSAT (Identity Profile Self Awareness Tool) leadership coach. Jolene is also a Certified Church Consultant through CC.U (ChurchConsultation.University).

Jolene is fluent in Spanish and has volunteered and studied in various countries including Mexico, El Salvador, Costa Rica, Jamaica, Kenya, and South Africa. She is actively involved in her local church and community. Jolene lives in central NC with her husband, twin daughters and their dog Rex. She enjoys reading, writing and drinking coffee.

I can remember it like it was yesterday, and it happened 40 years ago this summer, which was my last summer working on our Illinois farm. Dark clouds were looming in the west as the front moved across the Mississippi River and the tremendous thunderstorm began to not only bring rain, lightning and thunder, but more importantly, hail! I can remember standing on our back porch and hearing the tremendous and torrential hail hit the old tin roof and I stood there in silence and watched it all come down. I felt so bad for my dad and our family as most of our corn and soybeans had just been planted in the past few days, since this was in early June.

I am so glad that something prompted me to go and get my film camera and take a couple of photos out the back porch door. I still have them in my photo album and while it is hard to describe them, they are mostly black, with a small circle of bright orange and yellow light emanating from the storm. My heart sank as I took those photos and I knew that most likely all of our crops were destroyed!

When we got up the next morning and drove around to the various fields to look at the crops, my fears were realized. The small corn and bean plants were shredded and only little stubs were sticking out of the ground. While we are not the "Wheat State" like Kansas, our family usually planted around 200 acres of wheat every year for a crop rotation, and it was all knocked to the ground and most of the kernels were

lying there as well. It was utter devastation and ruin for these crops. Fortunately, my dad had taken out crop insurance, so the corn and soybeans were replanted to produce a crop in the fall, but the wheat was gone and he was paid a sum for that loss.

I do want to make it perfectly clear that when you fund a charitable gift annuity, that it is not insurance. It is an agreement where the Kansas Baptist Convention Foundation, Inc. will pay the donor(s) a set sum of money each year for as long as they live. Still, my point here is that you are covered by the KBCF and your annuity payments will stay the same every year until you die and go to be with the Lord. You are covered by a multi-million dollar foundation, whose funds are invested well by our partners at Endeavor Wealth, and governed by our elected board of directors from all over the Central region. You do not have to worry about your gift being destroyed, devastated or ruined.

### **Back to School: Learning of Terms Related to Senior Healthcare**

As school gears up, we are reminded that we are always learning, even as we begin to consider senior care needs. Understanding the differences between the various senior living terms can be quite confusing. When you're trying to make decisions about a loved one's health care, it helps to know exactly what the words and phrases mean, especially since definitions can vary by state or community.

**Senior Living** is simply a term that applies to how and where a senior citizen lives. This is often used as a broad umbrella term for all types of living options. Independent Living can mean staying in one's own home, but there are **Senior Independent Living Communities**, which are suitable for people still able to live alone, who would like access to some support and services, such as maintenance, dining options, medical care or entertainment. There may also be opportunities to have transportation, housekeeping or even laundry services. Senior Independent Living Communities are much like traditional housing communities with some extra age limits or restrictions. Whether at home, in this kind of facility or in a community, independent seniors have the option of hiring additional home health care providers or of using medical alert systems to summon assistance. Housing with Services allows a person to live in a home or apartment with other seniors, while provided with a range of possible services, such as delivered meals, housekeeping and personal care. Extensive care, such as that provided in a skilled nursing facility, is not supplied, but a small amount of additional help with meals or activities can allow a resident to keep their general independence.

Living in an **Assisted Living Facility** is often considered when additional support is needed. Assisted Living facilities offer a small amount of assistance with the senior's daily care, but not the full resources of skilled nursing. Typically, assisted living residents have their own rooms or apartments, but share community rooms and services, which might be one or more meals provided, 24-hour security, medication assistance, and entertainment and recreation. Some facilities provide transportation, perhaps at an additional cost, or off-site activities, such as shopping or dining out.

A Nursing Home (or sometimes referred to as Long Term Care) is a residence for elderly or disabled people who need permanent or long-term continual care. Help with taking medications, eating, dressing, hygiene and other daily activities is provided as needed. Services included at a nursing home would be the attention of nurses, assistants and aides, as well as occupational, physical and speech therapists. Other terms used for a nursing home are Convalescent Home, Skilled Nursing Unit, Rest Home or Care Home. Nursing homes, by any name, include all meals, housekeeping and daily health care, and most provide entertainment and recreational activities suitable to each patient.

SCHOOL

A **Skilled Nursing Facility** is an in-patient residence, which provides everything around-the-clock that a person who, because of age or disability, cannot do for themselves independently. Included will be medically trained staff, licensed nurses, physical and occupational therapists, as well as food and bodily care. Skilled Nursing Homes can be a temporary option for receiving rehabilitation after an accident or surgery or can be long-term or permanent care. Many nursing homes are certified as Skilled Nursing Facilities.

Continuum of Care Retirement Communities are facilities which offer multiple levels of senior care. Services may include independent living, assisted living, skilled nursing and hospice care all on the same campus. With all service options provided in one facility or campus, the resident can continue in a familiar setting and make friendships within the community, no matter what progression their condition takes. Although not a full continuum of care retirement community, Prairie Homestead Senior Living in Wichita offers several options for Senior Independent Living (offering twin homes and patio homes) as well as Assisted Living services.

In the long run, when discussing senior care options, one should always ask for definitions of terms used. It's advisable to know exactly what level of care one's loved one will receive, what costs are included with each level of care, and how a resident's progress or decline will affect care and cost. There is nothing wrong with asking questions when getting clear answers will make someone's life and care better, and the best long-term care service providers will be helpful and informative.


# Mount Pleasant Baptist Church, Hoxie, KS Celebrates their 135th Anniversary!
