WHERE YOU GO, I WILL GROW

But Ruth said, "Do not press me to leave you, to turn back from following you! Where you go, I will go; where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people and your God my God. Ruth 1:16 NRSVUE

Fifteen years have passed since I stood among the great coast redwoods located just north of San Francisco, near the town of Mill Valley, CA. As guests enter the front gate of Muir Woods, they are greeted by a redwood cross section that was taken from a fallen tree. Based on the concentric rings, the tree (that came down in 1930) was believed to be approximately 1,021 years old. Once you begin to walk the paths leading deeper into the forest, the majestic presence and sacred structures begin to overtake your senses. While their longevity, height and circumference are impressive, the most impressive thing about these giant sequoia sempervirens is their root system. Instead of growing deep roots, they grow lateral roots. Eventually, each individual tree's root system intertwines with the other trees around them. Their ability to survive and thrive is based on their interconnectedness with others.

While the Bible is filled with pages of relational examples of how God's people survived and thrived the various circumstances they endured, one of my favorite stories is found in the book of Ruth. Although there is a myriad of lessons that can be gleaned from just five short chapters, one that rises to the top for me is the choice that Ruth made to stay in relationship with Naomi. She could have gone home. She could have gone back to her father's house. She could have returned to her people. But she didn't. Looking at this biblical witness from the vantage point of several millennia later, how profoundly grateful we are that Ruth decided to form "lateral roots" and intertwine her life with Naomi's.

As you consider the various people in your life, who would be those with whom you have formed "lateral roots"? These are the lives that have become intertwined with yours through the various relationships in your life and those whom you choose to be interconnected with. They serve as a tremendous reminder of who God is and how God created us to function in this world. God is relational, has designed humanity to be relational, and has set an example for us through the

existence of the Trinity. We are not designed to go it alone, to be completely self-sufficient, or fully rely on self to traverse this journey we call life. We are created to put our roots down in Christ Jesus and to form an interconnectedness with other believers. In doing so, we will bear witness to the One who created us, the One who sustains us and the One who has redeemed us.

During the past four years that I have written this article, I have always focused on Thanksgiving during the month of November. I still want to do that this year, but in a different way. I want to divide it up between thanks and giving. While I always try to be thankful for everyone, every place, everything and every aspect of my life, of course, like everyone else, I am not perfect and there are some days when I may not be thankful at all, even though I try to be.

Having worked for the Kansas Baptist Convention Foundation for 5 years now and having served as the Director of Planned Giving for almost 4 years now, I have to say from the bottom of my heart that I am thankful for all of you, our annuitants and beneficiaries! You are the reason that we exist and that we have been around for almost 66 years. Without you, your funds, your gifts and your Investments in the foundation, we would not have a leg to stand on. Some of you have been our annuitants for a while and some for a very long time and the KBCF is supremely grateful that you have entrusted your funds to us during the past six decades plus.

I am also thankful for our accountants, our board, our region and foundation staff and our excellent investment team at Endeavor Management, Inc. All of these important people serve a vital role in a variety of areas in the work of the foundation.

While it may sound more trivial, I am also thankful for our planned giving software, PG Calc, and their superior team of managers, experts and tech support, who are always there when I need them.

I also want to say a big thank you to my colleague, Rev. Wilma Engle, who is my trusted advisor, knowledgeable consultant, and there for me when I need her as well.

Finally, I want to say thank you to each of you who read this article every month in the Central Region Life. I never really hear any complaints, comments or critiques from you, but I do welcome them all as part of my learning and growing experience while I serve the foundation community.

Now I want to focus on giving because I want to share some important facts from studies that came out in a report on giving this year. This report is called the Giving USA Annual Report on Philanthropy and it is for the year 2024. This report estimates that \$592 5 billion dollars of charitable giving happened last year in 2024. Of that amount, three quarters of the money came from individuals, 20% came from foundations and 8% from corporations.

Here are a few more findings from the report. During the past four decades, total charitable giving has grown in most years, even after adjusting for inflation. This pattern indicates neither changes in tax law nor shifts in the balance of political power have had much impact on giving. What they have also found out is that, in general, the way the economy goes, so does charitable giving.

Also during the past 40 years, individual giving has dropped from about 80% of total giving to 75% while foundation giving has increased from about 5% to nearly 20%.

Another companion report by Giving USA entitled "Giving by Generation" offers some reasons for optimism. I expect that some of you already know this, but their report finds that the Baby Boomer generation continues to outgive other generations by a significant margin. They also report that there is a strong correlation between involvement and engagement and giving. They say the good news is that the younger generations are the ones most likely to engage and become involved.

Still, you don't have to take my word for it, you can look up the report on your own. It is research that has been done by the Lilly School of Philanthropy and published in their report: Giving USA, The Annual Report on Philanthropy for the Year 2024. You can easily do an internet search and find the report online. There are more facts and findings in there, plus there are a lot of multicolored charts and graphs as well. It is a very helpful resource if you want to learn more.


If you're able to arrive in Council Grove on Friday evening, join us for an informal dinner and time of fellowship to begin the retreat with connection and rest.


